First Reading	AM 6:1a, 4-7
Second Reading	1 TIM 6:11-16
Gospel	LK 16:19-31

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus.

Some years ago, a young man from a small town in the West was traveling with his grandfather. They stopped at a diner, and the boy noticed a homeless man outside the window, shivering in the cold. The boy felt sorry but said nothing. His grandfather quietly stepped outside, handed the man a warm cup of coffee, and said, "Remember, our blessings are not really ours until they bless someone else." That simple gesture stayed with the boy for life.

Brothers and sisters, today's readings invite us to reflect on how God calls us to live with compassion, responsibility, and eternal perspective. We are reminded that wealth, comfort, and security while not evil in themselves but can become barriers if they blind us to the needs of others. The Word of God asks us: *Do I see the Lazarus at my door?*

In the first reading, the prophet Amos warns the complacent people of Israel. They lie on ivory beds, eat choice meats, sing idle songs, and drink fine wine, but they ignore the ruin of their nation. For this reason, Amos says, they will be the first to go into exile. He condemns not wealth itself, but indifference and selfishness. In the second reading, St. Paul encourages Timothy and through him, all of us to "pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness." The Christian life is a noble struggle: not to cling to riches, but to fight the good fight of faith and live with our eyes fixed on the eternal promise of God, who alone has immortality.

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives us the powerful parable of the rich man and Lazarus. The rich man dresses in purple, feasts every day, and ignores poor Lazarus lying at his very door. After death, their fortunes reverse. Lazarus rests in Abraham's bosom, while the rich man suffers torment. Notice that the rich man is not condemned because he was wealthy, but because he failed to act with mercy and justice. He knew Lazarus was there, and he chose to do nothing.

Dear Friends, here in Cody, we know what it means to live with both blessings and challenges, close-knit communities, wide-open land, hardworking families, but also neighbours who struggle quietly with poverty, addiction, loneliness, or spiritual emptiness. Who are the Lazaruses in our community? Perhaps it is the single mother juggling two jobs, the elderly man in a nursing home with no

visitors, the teenager wrestling with depression, or the newcomer who feels unwelcome. The readings challenge us not just to feel sorry, but to respond in sharing our time, attention, and resources. Even a small gesture like the grandfather's cup of coffee can change a life. Wealth and comfort are temporary. What lasts forever is love lived in action.

So what should we carry with us today?

- **See with God's Eyes** – Ask the Lord to open your eyes to the Lazarus at your doorstep.
- **Blessed to Bless** – Whatever we have as faith, family, resources - is given so it can be shared.
- **Live with Eternal Perspective** – As St. Paul says, "Fight the good fight of faith." Earthly comforts fade, but love and justice endure.
- **Act Today** – The rich man had his chance in life, but not after death. Let us act now, while we can.

As we celebrate the Eucharist today, let us remember that Christ Himself became poor for our sake, that we might become rich in His love. He feeds us not with scraps, but with His own Body and Blood. May we leave this Mass strengthened to see Christ in the poor, to serve Him in our neighbours, and to live with hearts set on eternal life. Amen.

Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Am 6:1a, 4-7 | 1 Tim 6:11-16 | Lk 16:19-31

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Have you ever had a moment when you felt yourself to be the underdog, and wished that there were some champion who would come and defend your cause? Today, we see God described in those terms. Our psalm tells us that the Lord “raises up those who are bowed down,” that he “protects strangers,” and “the fatherless and the widow he sustains.” But God doesn’t stop there. He wants *us* to become champions for the poor. Notice that our Gospel reading depicts the poor man named Lazarus in such a way that we cannot help but feel compassion for him. Here is a man who is in dire need, covered in sores, right outside the door of a rich man who has more than enough to provide for his own needs and those of Lazarus – but does nothing to help him. In fact, the rich man’s *dog* shows more compassion toward Lazarus (by licking his sores) than the rich man! The story is meant to prick our consciences and move us to have the same kind of response that God has – of compassion – leading us to become champions for those in need.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Throughout our history, the Church has been particularly effective at spreading the faith during those times when we’ve put care for the poor and vulnerable at the center of our action. Before the advancements of modern medicine, members of the early Church risked their lives to care for those sick with contagious diseases. Their selfless example led many to faith in Christ. While our situation is much different today, we are called at the beginning of the first reading to not be complacent in our efforts to care for the poor. As we serve those most in need, our witness will likewise draw others to seek to know and follow the God of compassion whom we serve.

SERVE

One of the ways we can fight against complacency is to engage in service. Check your parish or local charitable organizations for opportunities to serve those in need in your community. No matter what kind of service you choose to engage in, do everything with “love, patience, and gentleness,” as Paul reminds us today. Then we will be models of God’s own care for the poor.

EXTRAORDINARY MINISTER AND LECTOR TRAINING

Fully initiated adults who are in full communion with the Catholic Church and approved by the pastor may volunteer for this ministry. While the Bishop/Priest alone is the Ordinary of the Eucharist, since only he can consecrate the Sacred Species, a layperson may be commissioned as an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion. This ministry complements and extends the ministry of the clergy.

The **Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion** is properly formed, instructed, and commissioned for an appointed time to aid in the distribution of the Body and Blood of Christ at Vigil, Sunday and Holy Day Masses. An Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion may also offer Holy Communion to the sick and homebound.

Requirements for one considering the ministry of Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion:

Has approval of the pastor

Is at least 18 years of age

Demonstrates a mature faith

Is a fully initiated member of the Church, i.e. has received the sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation

If married, is validly married according to the laws of the Church

Participates in all formation sessions and is open to ongoing enrichment, both spiritual and practical

The **lector** has been entrusted with the honor of proclaiming the Word of God to the assembly during the Liturgy of the Word at Mass. Treating the proclamation of the Scripture seriously, solemnly, and sacredly, the lector prays with and studies the Word of God before proclaiming the Scripture clearly to provide the assembly with a meaningful encounter with the living Word. The lector may also read the General Intercessions.
